

Veterans Today

- Difficulty transitioning to civilian workforce (Zogas, 2017)
 - Especially younger veterans (Shane, 2019)
 and females (Mittal, 2019)
- Thanks to the GI Bill, many are going/returning to college
 - 1M+ by next year (Lipka, 2011)
 - Many are pursuing cybersecurity
 (Fucci, 2017)





Internships


- Recommended for all students, including veterans (Gonyea, Kinzie, Kuh, & Laird, 2008)
- Should be a requirement for graduating (Giordani, 2012)
- Excellent for cybersecurity (McGettrick, 2013)



The Seminar



- Host a weekly veterancentered cybersecurity seminar
 - Address veteran-specific issues
 - Constant feedback on programs
 - Pulse on internship and transition experiences



The Unofficial Pre-Pilot "Study"



- Qualitative in nature (phenomenological interview)
- 6 friends/students (participants)
 - Graduates of MS in Cybersecurity degree program
- Tested the waters
 - Tested my interview skills
 - Tested some interview questions
 - 100% voluntary
 - 100% anonymous



The Big Question



How has your internship experiences helped or hindered your transition from the military to the civilian workforce?





Alpha:

"Ultimately internships have been <u>very positive</u> for me, in one I was able to <u>understand the business</u> a little more and in another internship I was exposed to people that were not military. It was a <u>very civilian job</u>, so I was able to work in [an] environment that was much different than what I came out of so the internship fully <u>helped me to see how a civilian company works."</u>



Bravo:

"My experience was <u>very positive</u>. My internship was with a company that used cutting edge technology, so I had the opportunity to **learn many new things**. The team members were excellent, a couple of them I have been keeping in touch with and we've been **helping each other in our job search**."

Charlie:

"It allowed for me to add some relevant or basic information for pursuing a change in career. It wouldn't necessarily be value added if I were already in the cybersecurity field. It was extremely difficult to figure out how to get into an internship. Allowed for my resume to include information and knowledge regarding's policies and procedures within cyber security and to establish a baseline. I can't say that it hindered the transition but was beneficial. Unfortunately, I feel my own internship experience was less than stellar and didn't really teach me a lot and I had to figure things out on my own."



Delta:

"It was a <u>very positive</u> experience the actual project I was working on was <u>very useful in my employment</u> on a cyber ranges which is something I <u>continued to do my current position</u>."



Echo:

"My internship experiences were <u>very positive</u>, internship turned into a full-time job. There's a lot of civilian terminology that I was exposed to when onboarding and other various words that I didn't understand until I enrolled into the internship."

Experiences of Veterans **FOXTROT**

Foxtrot:

"My internship has <u>helped</u> me in many ways. The principal manner being building a resume that I knew at the end they [employers] would be looking for."

The Results



Two overarching themes:

- 1. Benefited from internship
 - 4 said "Very positive"
 - 1 said "Beneficial"
 - 1 said "Helped"



- 2. Learned how to work in a civilian workforce environment
 - Terminology, new skills, new things, build a resume, understand the business

My assessment:

A positive internship experience *most likely* equates to a positive transition experience for veterans
